Germany is a country located in central Europe, northeast of France. Most of Germany's residents are have lived in Germany their whole lives. But about nine percent of the country population is originally from another country. Most of the immigrants are from Turkey. There are foreigners from other countries, and most come to escape the harsh rulings of their own countries.

Most of Germany's people live in the large cities. Munich, Hamburg, and Berlin have more than a million people apiece. Several other cities have at least a couple hundred thousand people. Next to no people live in the rural countryside. Nearly one-third of all Germans are Protestant, and another third are Roman Catholic. The rest of the population is Jewish, Muslim, Hindu, or other faiths. Some people don't participate in the religious practice.

Some of the world's biggest musical geniuses were from Germany. Johannes Brahms, Sebastian Bach, and the infamous Ludwig Van Beethoven all originated from Germany. Brahms wrote music for many instruments including violins, singers, pianos, and orchestras. Bach was a master composer whose works are still heard in concert halls all over the world. And Beethoven composed magnificent music, even after he became deaf. These three musicians are known as the "three Bs."

Over the years, European countries began to grow tensions against each other, always competing to have stronger armies and better governments. In 1914, World War I

broke out. The outcome of the war was devastating to Germany. By the time it was over four years later, over six million Germans had lost their lives. The countries that beat Germany forced them to hand over all the riches the country had. Germany's economy failed. There was a shortage of jobs, and the prices of necessities like food and clothing were hiked up to a price that people couldn't afford. After the war, the Germans were desperate for a strong leader that would keep their country together. They made the mistake of choosing Adolf Hitler.

In 1933, Hitler became Germany's chancellor. The Germans adored him, but what they didn't know was that he was a man with no morals, who was willing to kill anyone who threatened his power. He also killed many people that he believed were inferior to him. He plotted to weed Germany of all people like Jews, who were different. It was he who started World War II.

World War II went on for six years, after which it lost again. The country divided into two parts after the war: East Germany and West Germany. The capital, Berlin, was also divided, right down the middle. West Germany and West Berlin were democratic, and East Germany and East Berlin were under a communist government.
